

Canadian Red Cross

The Canadian Red Cross is a non-profit humanitarian organization dedicated to improving the situation of vulnerable people at home and around the world.

Through a network of trained volunteers, the Canadian Red Cross can quickly respond to disasters wherever and whenever they strike, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

What is a Personal Disaster?

A personal disaster is a sudden devastating event that overwhelms an individual's or family's ability to cope using its own resources.

How does the Personal Disaster Assistance team work?

When personal disasters strike, the Canadian Red Cross in Manitoba may provide up to 72 hours of emergency clothing, shelter, food and essential supplies.

The Red Cross recruits teams of local volunteers from communities throughout the province. These volunteers undergo standardized Red Cross training in disaster response. The Red Cross then provides them with the tools, supplies and support needed for responding to disasters.

Following a disaster, PDA team members respond either in person or by phone. They provide assistance based on individual needs, and according to Red Cross standards.

What is the value of PDA in your community?

By working with local authorities and agencies, the Red Cross maximizes available support and makes it as easy as possible for clients to access this support, while avoiding duplication of services.



Community Level Response

- Partnership between First Nations, Indigenous Services Canada, Canadian Red Cross
 - Unique to Manitoba
 - We are (if needed) the EMO for First Nations in Manitoba
 - Ability to instantly add required capacity to First Nations
 - Flexible – not one size fits all

Community Level Response

ACTIVATION

- Activation may simply be local and a normal occurrence.
 - Capacity constantly assessed.
 - If the event is larger or more complex than the community can handle itself, partners may be engaged to bolster capacity.
 - Partners may be local (neighbours, Tribal Council, etc.)
 - ISC and Canadian Red Cross is standing by to support

Community Level Response

Activating ISC/CRC

- 1.** The Chief and/or majority of Council are responsible for declaring a State of Local Emergency via a Band Council Resolution, usually in consultation with the community's Emergency Manager.
- 2.** Upon the declaration of the State of Emergency, the Chief and/or Council will notify ISC (Indigenous Services Canada) via their 24/7 Duty Officer line.

We have since additionally supported 3 communities following 2016 tornados - and 2 following 2017 floods.



- ✓ Accessible (both location and language)
- ✓ Destructible (Lots of "Tear-aways")
- ✓ Leadership-down / Household-up
- ✓ Proactive (not just a response doc)
- ✓ Living document

Plan Inspirations

- **Nelson House** - Pets, Privacy statement, Community asset tables
- **Swan Lake** - Asset Survey (and 6 plans in 6 corners of community" idea)
- **Wuskwi Sipiik** - Colour coded response checklists
- **MCFN** - Messaging, Add examples to the role sheets. Have two versions of role sheet... One in response and one outside response.
- **Chemewawin** - Stayback organization, Fire experience, security ideas.
- **Poplar River** - Org chart, Stayback org and name, Silent List, Opt Out form, Fire Experience, Community Liaison role. Tips and Tricks
- **Brokenhead** - Mapping ideas. Use of Open Street Map

- **Little Grand Rapids** – Pandemic planning and response
- **York Factory** - Pandemic planning and response

Sagkeeng - Pets, Mapping ideas

Roseau River - Flood planning, Ring Dike sealed community thoughts (preparing for garbage etc). Pet planning (notably vaccination difficulty).

Peguis - Flood experience

Long Plain - Recovery, Asset Mapping, tornado experience, Power outage challenges. Tips and Tricks

Island Lakes - Time sheet experience (especially how to log hours)




	Hazard	Risk/Likelihood	Impact/Disruption	Score	Comments
1	Airplane Crashes	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	7	Low chance but in middle of community
2	Watercraft Accident	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	5	Mod-High chance but no large boats
3	Motor Vehicle Accident	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	7	High chance impacting up to 10 people – especially on ice road.
4	Ice Accidents	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	6	High chance impacting few people. Main risk is snowmobiles.
5	Train Derailment	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	5	Low chance. Low impact (far away – not relied on)
6	Blizzard	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	7	High chance but we are prepared
7	Ice Storm	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	6	High chance but we are fairly prepared
8	Extreme Cold	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	7	High chance but we are prepared
9	Extreme Heat	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	8	High chance but we are prepared
10	Hail Storm	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	7	Not unusual. Normally small hail.
11	Lightning and Thunderstorm	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	6	Normal. Unless causes other issues, no concern.
12	Windstorm	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	8	Not unusual and can be moderately disruptive if power issues
13	Tornado	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	6	Unlikely but high impact if happened. Both damage and fear.
14	Air Contamination	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	7	Smoke can get bad and asthma common
15	Soil Contamination	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	4	No major risks other than fuel which is isolated.
16	Water Contamination	☆☆☆☆☆	☆☆☆☆☆☆	8	Happens occasionally and can disrupt community for a day or two.





Roles and Responsibilities
